

This is understandable since doubt gets blamed for almost everything in churches today – low attendance at Sunday service, the popularity of high profile antibelievers (such as the recently deceased Christopher Hitchens), the general moral decline of Western civilization, etc, etc. It's easy to fall into a simplistic way of thinking that equates doubt with atheism, secular humanism, turning away from God or whatever you want to call it.

But in the Episcopal Church we like to do things just a little differently. We pride ourselves on being "the thinking person's church", and I take this idea very seriously, having come from a background where thinking about faith was actively discouraged and sometimes even condemned. To me one of the most wonderful things about being an Episcopalian is that we are free to express our questions, our opinions and, yes, our doubts in an open and loving environment. And believe me, <u>you cannot be a thinking</u> <u>person and not have doubts</u>. No way. No how.

Faith is not absence of doubt; it is persisting through doubt, just as courage is not absence of fear, but persisting through fear. Without doubt there is really no faith – another one of those paradoxes God has dropped into this crazy world.

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In any case, next time you find yourself deeply in doubt, remember that you are in very good company indeed– Jesus himself. After all, weren't his last words – "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"



Answers: Tabitha, Dorcas



Winter is a difficult time for people in need, so make this scarf to help someone stay warm.

#### What you need:

- Medium-weight polar fleece, 60" standard width (a 9" portion will make one scarf)
- Scissors
- An adult to help

#### What you do:

- 1. Cut a piece of mediumweight polar fleece to the size of 60" x 9". Cut the fabric across its width so the material is stretchy.
- 2. Trim off the edge binding. To add "fringe" along each end, make a 6"-long cut every half inch.
- 3. For curly fringe, pull each strand and then let go sharply. Another attractive option is to tie an overhand knot at the top of each strip.
- 4. Donate your scarf to a local group that helps people in need. For greater impact, encourage your Sunday school classmates or other friends to make scarves, too.

# 2011 Diocesan Convention Report

The convention was held this year in Dayton at the Hope Hotel. Your delegates were Kim Holbert, Jack and Betsy Kitch, and Doug Pultz. Mother Lynn and Pete attended as well as Summer Watts who became a voting delegate when Betsy became ill. The church was well represented with volunteers: Tanya Ellenburg-Kimmet, Chandra Hightower, Pam Feinour and Mike Taint.

The lead up to this year's annual convention was a very long one. When concerns about the diocesan budget arose in 2010, Bishop Breidenthal decided to put the financial planning on hold, solicit input from the congregations in the Diocese of Southern Ohio, and reshape the profile of the regional church based on the input he received. After many meetings and much debate, the new budget was accepted by the convention.

Several resolutions that were considered during the convention:

- **ADOPTED-** A resolution in support of diocesan missionaries, the Dohns. The Diocese of Southern Ohio reaffirmed its commissioning of Doctors Anita and Michael Dohn as medical missionaries serving on behalf of the Diocese of Southern Ohio.
- **ADOPTED-** Deepening our kinship in Christ with the Episcopal Church of Liberia. The Diocese of Southern Ohio affirms and celebrates its new friendship with the Episcopal Church in Liberia. The Diocese of Southern Ohio will continue to work to deepen its kinship with the Episcopal Church of Liberia for an additional two years of dialogue with exploration and implementation of common ministry projects in Liberia and Southern Ohio. After two years the progress of this dialogue will be evaluated along with the opportunity for continued shared ministries.
- **ADOPTED-** Concerning the practice of high-volume, horizontal hydraulic fracturing, known as fracking. The 137th Convention of the Diocese of Southern Ohio supports: The efforts of the United States Environmental Protection Agency to conduct a comprehensive, transparent, peer-reviewed study of the impacts of natural gas on water resources and the life-cycle impacts of fracking fluids, and a moratorium on high-risk, unconventional deep-shale gas drilling in Ohio until this study is completed and regulatory agencies have conducted a comprehensive review and revision of Ohio's regulatory framework in relation to the new technologies of high-volume, horizontal hydraulic fracturing tactics.
- **FAILED, as amended** Theology of the Mission Share, That Diocesan Council continue reforming the Mission Share Formula in the Diocese of Southern Ohio and present a plan at the next Diocesan Convention, which moves towards a vision of biblical equity and the preferential option for the poor, and takes into consideration the following four proposals:
  - 1. That congregations whose growth, or maintenance of steady attendance, is chiefly from low income households reached by their ministries not be asked to contribute more proportionally on the basis of Average Sunday Attendance;
  - 2. That increased reliance on endowment and special gift income in such congregations not be considered on the same basis as available income from parishioners' pledges;

- 3. That the heavy investment of their existing assets (building, utilities, maintenance, staff time, volunteers) in direct service, empowerment, and community organizing be honored by the Diocese as contributions to the common witness even though it does not flow in the form of funding to the Diocesan budget;
- 4. That adjustments to the income side of the Diocesan budget be made in partnership with congregations who have more financial resources and have accepted decreases in their Mission Share with the new formula.
- **FAILED-** Support for job creation policies. The Convention of the Diocese of Southern Ohio directs that the following resolution be filed with the Secretary of the General Convention for consideration by the 77th General Convention of The Episcopal Church: The House of

\_\_\_\_\_\_ concurring, that The General Convention of The Episcopal Church urge the U.S. President and Congress to approve a serious, multi-faceted program as a solution to the current intolerable level of unemployment in this country. Such a program should include initiatives such as the following:

- a. A bold new federal program, solely focused on the creation of new jobs
  - Creating a long-term program to rebuild the nation's infrastructure which would create jobs and establish the platform for 21st century industries.
  - Moving to a greener economy, with most of the new manufacturing taking place within the United States.
  - A variation of the depression-era programs of the Works Progress Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corp to put economically distressed young people to work on projects beneficial for society.
- b. Trade policies and treaties that are more sensitive to concerns affecting workers, keeping more good jobs in the countries involved in the treaties.
- c. Increased funding for job-training programs both in basic education and in vocational training for those unprepared for the current job market; strengthening employable skills programs in community colleges and increasing the number of those completing college.
- d. National legislation more supportive of the union movement; and greater solidarity among workers themselves, for instance workers accepting less hours per week so that more workers can have jobs.
- e. Federal tax credits for companies creating new jobs.

With the work of the convention completed, Bishop Breidenthal challenged us in several ways: The first was to place an emphasis on adult forum which has gone to the wayside in many congregations. The second challenge was for churches to continue to move out into their communities to continue to serve those in need. Also, the bishop challenged us to be more attentive to the needs of those abroad. The commitment to help rebuild a cathedral in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, served as the symbolic centerpiece to this new outward orientation.

Serving the church as a delegate was a good experience, overall. It was an enjoyable time with the other attendees from our parish, and it was great seeing so many clergy again from the Dayton Deanery and the Diocese who supported our church with their encouragement, prayers, and presence when we were without consistent clergy.

# Churches come together to celebrate Martin Luther King, Jr.



Greene County residents will come together to celebrate one of the civil rights movement's most influential and important leaders on Monday, Jan. 16, when the annual Martin Luther King Day Community Service is held at Westminster Presbyterian Church, 990 Old Springfield Pike.

This year's service is being sponsored by the Xenia Area Association of Churches and Ministries (XAACM) and the African American Ministerial Alliance (AAMA). According to Marlene Elliot, a XAACM member, the service has become a popular, well-attended annual event. Last year, more than 300 people came to the service to recognize the achievements of Martin Luther King.

"It's wonderful to see people from different churches coming together to honor this one man," said Elliott.

The event will begin at 7 p.m. in Westminster's sanctuary. Attendees can expect a blend of hymns, prayers, scripture readings and performances by a number of singers, including Lisa Hess, Debbie West and Lynorra Grace. The AAMA Community Choir will also perform a piece and musician Jeff Carter will provide a guitar instrumental.



An offering will be taken up during the service for the American Red Cross Greene County Housing Program. Attendees will also get to hear a message, delivered by Pastor Edgar Wallace of the First United Christian Church. According to Rex Robinson, the organizer of this year's service, Wallace's message will be the event's high point.

"Dr. Wallace is a strong thinker, preacher and a great man of God," said Robinson. "His message will be the highlight."


