We will be needing socks, gloves, mittens and we always need underwear both men's and women's. IHN have been good to help us out with clothing they receive and can't immediately use. They have a storage problem also.



Nehemiah's concern

Sonia was crying. The creditors were threatening to take her house unless she paid her loan. The loan principal was 800 pesos (about US\$ 21) borrowed about two months previously. She had spent her savings for surgery for her daughter and her mother last summer. She was short of cash. When the school year began, she needed an additional 800 pesos to enroll her four children in school. She was going to pay it off next payday. She was laid off at work and the next payday never came. Meanwhile, the usurious interest rates accumulated until now, eight weeks later, she owed 3,000 pesos (about US\$ 79). She had put her house up as collateral and was now stuck.

High interest rates and financing charges abound in poor people's lives. I have seen poor people here pay four times or more the cash retail price of an appliance because they use shortterm financing. I saw the same thing in rent-to-own operations in the Over the Rhine and East Walnut Hills areas in Cincinnati. I wonder if overpaying for a TV just to have it now is really worth it. In contrast, getting your children registered for school by the deadline seems to me a reasonable "need."

Poverty, like wealth, tends to be trans-generational. Sonia had no family that could help, and was forced to go to the loan sharks for money.

We loaned Sonia the money to pay the loan shark. She will pay us back in installments over the next three months. At least her children will have a home in which to study now that they are registered for school.

Nehemiah was concerned that development (trying to get that wall built) was being delayed because some citizens were taking advantage of their own people through high interest rates and enslavement (Nehemiah 5:1-13). Perhaps things change less than we might hope over the millennia.

Dear All:

More Joy! If you have read the blog, this is pretty much a repeat of the last entry. We still wanted to pass this on to those of you who don't get to the blog. You just don't get the photos here (smile). I am trying to put some of the photos on FB. This was quite a different time than the previous trips to Bogota and Ramallah. Again, for photos and more of the whole story, <u>suk-djk.blogspot.com</u>.

ALSO - please let us know if you have questions or desire more info or whatever. Also, please keep us abreast of what we can hold in prayer for you.

We left Chalkyiksik on Tuesday afternoon – being seen off at the plane by Minnie and William, Jeff and Leslie and some of the kids. Mary was traveling with us on the same flight, as we helped her escort one young grandson to Ft. Yukon, and take her baby grandson for urgent medical treatment in Fairbanks (the baby needed minor surgery and is doing very well).

We spent Tuesday night with a lovely couple in Fairbanks, veterans of service in the Alaskan villages. David was off to the lower 48 Wednesday morning. Sarah had a debriefing session with Archdeacon Anna, and then was off in the afternoon. A bit after midnight on Wednesday, we were both back home.

So we are decompressing and transitioning back (smile). It will obviously take some time for us to process the experience.

The fulcrum of the time in Chalkyitsik was clearly Sarah's pastoral ministry. That being the case, the details of most of what went on are not the kind of things one can share. It presented a range of fresh and new challenges for each of us. When serving others, there are deep, intricate and symbiotic relationships amongst what one is "doing" for and with others, what they are "doing" for and with you, and what God is doing in and with ALL those involved. The miracle of the with-God life.

So – how then to let you know what we "did" these past five weeks? We can say that the time was hard and good. We were present and available to the people there, we listened, Sarah provided pastoral ministry to the Church and the greater community, we ministered to and supported Mary, who serves a priest in Ft. Yukon with an extremely challenging ministry. We learned hard and good things about the world of the village and about ourselves.

And we had the privilege, however briefly, of being part of the lives of truly beautiful people. We would be honored to share life with them again this side of eternity.

The time was clearly blessed – and there was certainly a desire expressed by those in the village and the leadership at the diocese that we return.

Following the Bishop's visit, Sarah led a foot-washing service on Wednesday, a Communion Service on Thursday and her final Sunday morning service. All intermixed with visits, visits and visits. There is a woman in the village who we believe may be called to diaconal ministry, and Sarah spent a good deal of time with her. In this final week of our stay, some things "came out of the woodwork" so to speak, and Sarah spent time with individuals on specific matters. Sarah did pick up some kind of a bug the final weekend there. It has been a bit up and down the past few days, but she is recovering. And we will continue to process and integrate what God has for each of us as we continue to listen.

We want to look each of you in the eyes and say, "THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR YOUR SUPPORT." We know even more thoroughly now that we would not be able to pour ourselves out in these situations without the depth of support we have and the grace that bestows.

Thank you, thank you, thank you.

We will see if the Lord takes us back.

Well, Sarah starts back at the church this Sunday and her first meetings at school start on Friday, August 28. On that same Friday, David starts graduate school at ETSC/Claremont. Whoosh! 

Stewardship FAQs

Q. What *is* "proportional giving"???

A. Deciding on the percentage of our income we will give this year as our financial stewardship, and giving that percentage. It's the first step toward the tithe, if we choose.

Q. What happens if I lose my income??



Q. What's so important about the tithe?

A. It's the biblical standard and the standard of the Episcopal Church, that tells us that keeping 90% of all we have, and returning 10% back to God, is a pretty fair standard.

Q. If I make the commitment to tithe, when do I begin?

A. We begin by deciding on the percentage we can reasonably do this year – and increasing it a little every year until we reach our goal.

- Q. Is that a percentage of our gross income, or our net income?
- A. Whatever we decide in prayer.
- Q. Does it all go to the Church?


A. Again – whatever, in prayer, we're called to do each year. It certainly can and often does include our other "holy giving".

Q. What's so important about making a pledge?

A. The same thing that's important about any commitment we make. If something's really important to us - close to our hearts – we make a commitment to it! Our pledge is our public commitment to our Church.

Q. Are pledges made public?

A. Never the amount - just the act itself, when we place our pledge in the basket, bring it to the altar, etc. It's a witness to our brothers and sisters, and an encouragement.
