### Share 1-to-1 Ministry

To the wonderful people of Christ Episcopal Church Xenia:

Sometimes I question if the clothes closet is helping people or enabling them. Well...I'm sure the answer is both. As I tell the other volunteers: "There are a large amount of low-income that are "down on their luck" and could really use help. There are a few, however, that won't work and have no intention of ever working. You have to help a few of the second group (enabling them) to be able to help the large amount of the first group (truly help). That's why I'm so glad for the stories. It helps you know, really know, that we truly give this community.

A lady came to the clothes closet looking for pants. She couldn't believe that we gave the items away for free. We even helped her find her size. She told us that she had recently gotten a job and the manager told her that she was not allowed to wear blue jeans. She only owned two pairs of pants and both pairs were jeans. Our outstanding volunteer ladies helped her find not only several pants, but shirts and other items that she could use. She came back two weeks later and told us that we had literally saved the job for her. Apparently she is learning her job and the managers seem to think she doing well.

A man came into the clothes closet just as we were closing. Against my better judgment I stayed open and helped him find clothes. He needed a pair of nice pants and a jacket. We found two pairs of pants and then found a jacket and two shirts that fit him. As he was leaving, he told me that he had a job interview the next day. I have not seen him again. Hopefully that means he got the job. I am so glad I stayed late that day.

During the fall we gave away well over 300 coats and jackets. We stopped counting at 300. At least one third of the coats were good, heavy winter coats. The rest varied from warm to light jackets. We had coats for men, women, children, and infants. Unfortunately, we did not have coats for everyone who requested one. We also gave away a lot of hats, scarves, gloves, socks, and sweat shirts as well as the usual clothing. Several people thanked us profusely stating that they did not own any coat.

Before Christmas we pulled out all the Christmas items, toys, household items, knick-knacks, extra blankets and bedding, books, etc. Some were new, most were used. The down-stairs area was full of these items. Nearly every item was taken.

With the rate of unemployment in Xenia (which is higher than the national rate of unemployment), inflation rising, and jobs dwindling, the volunteers at the clothes closet feel that we are truly helping and providing a valuable service.

Thank you for the space for the clothes closet and your patience with us.

The first effort to produce the bazaar fizzled out and no one ever renewed the effort. The parish lost a substantial and important source of income.



Remove paper wrappers from crayons. (This is easier if you soak crayons in cool water first.) 3. Break crayons into small pieces. Place pieces into heart-shaped mold, filling them about two-thirds full. 4. Bake for 15 minutes or until crayons have completely melted.

When the heart-shaped crayons are cool, remove them from the mold.

### WHERE YOU LIVE GREENE COUNTY, OHIO

Did you know that there is an organization that calculates the health risks associated with diesel emissions? Diesel exhaust is one of the nation's most persistent sources of toxic air pollution. America's 11 million diesels—buses, trucks, trains, ships, and construction equipment—emit pollutants that lead to several health risks. The public health effects, including asthma attacks, heart attacks, stroke, cancer, and premature death.

Statistic: Greene County ranks 445 of 3,109 counties nationally from the risk from diesel soot.

Black carbon, a component of diesel pollution, is also one of the largest drivers of climate change. Black carbon is a form of particulate matter emitted by diesels and other sources that warms the atmosphere by absorbing sunlight and radiating heat into the air. It can also darken snow and ice, and directly accelerate melting. The United States has the highest per-capita emissions of black carbon in the world, with more than half coming from diesel engines.





Remembering Joanne Brooks

Joanne Brooks was born in Middletown in 1935. Her mother had been a professional accompanist and once accompanied for a future star of the Metropolitan Opera. Joanne began learning music around 3 years of age. She was versed in most instruments. She grew up in a Presbyterian church, but became involved with the Episcopal Church in 1948 because the church ran a teenage dance party after the ballgames. She was the assistant director of music and principal soloist in the Presbyterian Church. She also was chief soloist and assistant director of music at the Episcopal Church. She would perform at the services of the Presbyterian Church and then race to the Episcopal Church which started ½ hour later for her performance in their services. She finally joined the Episcopal Church in 1960, because she preferred the Episcopal services and the structure of the liturgy. She was



confirmed Episcopal in 1963. In 1982, Joanne moved to Xenia. She was interim director of the Presbyterian Church in Middletown and bell choir director at Westminster Presbyterian in Xenia. In 1984, Bill Roberts called Joanne to become assistant director of music at Christ Episcopal Church Xenia. She started with a 7 member choir and built up to 31 people at one point.

Joanne received her B.A. from the College of Wooster and her Masters at Miami University. She started her doctorate at U.D focusing on the works of the great English composer, conductor, and pianist, Benjamin Britten. Joanne taught music at public schools from 1957-1960. She taught at Miami University from 2000-2010. She has taught private lessons from 1956 until present.

Joanne has taken her love of music frequently into many directions. She was a soloist for Christian Science Church, director of the Middletown Civic Chorus in the 1960's, and founder/arranger for the Wayfarers folk group which toured the Ohio-Kentucky-Missouri area. She was the principle soloist in a group called Pro Musica and a music critic for the newspapers in the 1960's and 1970's. She developed a lecture series comparing black and white spirituals. She gave choral workshops where they worked on manuscripts for women composers and conductors. She formed, composed music, and directed a semi-pro women's chorus from 1983-1985. She worked with the Choral Belles, whom toured with the Bonnie Lad's. She also assisted Zenobia Perry, Professor of Music Composition at Central State, in the editing of her CD of music compilations.

Joanne Brooks has had many noted musical accomplishments. She has brought us her love of liturgy and we have benefited with her musical direction and guidance. She went to sing with the angels on January 17<sup>th</sup>, 2013.

### a Discussion Whenever and Wherever You Choose!

This Lent, we invite anyone who is interested -- within the parishes of the Dayton-Five Rivers and Northwest Deaneries or anywhere else -- to join us in listening to the gospel according to Luke in a new way. We will be using a recently published book that offers a brief (usually about two-page) entry for each day, from Ash Wednesday (February 13) through Easter Saturday (April 6). Each of these entries provides a short reading from the gospel (in an engaging, contemporary translation), a brief comment on it, and a thoughtstarter titled "Today."

The book is Lent for Everyone: Luke, Year C, written by New Testament scholar and Bishop N.T. Wright (October 2012, Westminster John Knox Press). It is available from <u>Amazon</u> (paperback or Kindle) and from <u>Barnes and Noble</u> (paperback or Nook).

We invite each of you to consider using this book as the basis for your daily Lenten reflections. You may want to stop there, with your personal thoughts and prayers.

But, if you are willing to share your thoughts on what you have read with others, please consider visiting either St. Mark's web site, <u>http://stmarksdayton.org/</u> (and clicking on the image of our Lenten book), or our Facebook page,

https://www.facebook.com/stmarksdayton, and joining in the conversation (those commenting via our web site can use their Yahoo, AOL or Hotmail IDs to do so). The blog format will allow many people to discuss together what they see in each passage and how the gospel story pertains to and touches their own lives. Also, please consider inviting other people, especially young adults who are not currently church-goers, to join us as well.

This is an innovative and inviting way for all of us to do what we have promised in our baptismal vows: listen to, live, and share with others the Good News of God in Christ.

### Anita and Michael Dohn, Missionaries in Health Ministries January 2013 Mission E-mail [No. 101]

### Missionary Report

Anita and Michael Dohn are physicians serving as SAMS missionaries with La Iglesia Episcopal Dominicana at the diocesan Clínica Esperanza y Caridad. They live along the southern coast in San Pedro de Macorís in the Dominican Republic.

#### Sustainability and New Wine

We are shifting gears. We are cleaning house. We are preparing new wineskins.

December 2012 was the end of a five-year project that expanded and consolidated the community health promoter program that began in 2001.

Community surveys showed that health indicators related to the causes of preventable childhood deaths, women's health, and HIV/AIDS improved throughout the years, including the last two years when the groups were working without the benefit of resources from outside of their communities.

The groups' ability to carry-on and continue improving health conditions using only local community assets is a good sign. There is a lot of talk about sustainability in social ministry programs these days – this is one example of what sustainability looks like.

We will continue working with the health promoter groups, but in a different way. A new multi-year project starts in 2013. Over the past 18 months, domestic and gender-based violence emerged as a priority of the health promoter groups and as a focus of Dominican Pubic Health, Lambeth Palace, the Anglican Communion, World Council of Churches, and Episcopal Relief & Development, among others.

The community health staff is shifting gears to work with young people and communities to address and prevent domestic violence. The new project is both narrow (targeting seventh and eighth graders) and broad (involving health promoters, community leaders, parents, teachers, the public prosecutor's office, the national police, etc.). The project will assist people to examine gender roles, relationships, and cultural norms.

We expect the community health promoter groups to continue improving health in their communities for years to come. An aim with the new project is to equip young people to make a difference throughout a lifetime.
