Dear Friends,

When we lived in more southerly climes, March was a wonderful month filled with daffodils and tulips, greening grass and warm breezes. Even when March entered like a lion, it didn't take long to become a lamb. Although March here in Ohio isn't quite that balmy, I find that my spirits still lift and my eyes welcome the changing quality of sunlight, and in my heart, hope "springs eternal". I know the wait for spring is not so very long now, and my spirit rejoices.

It seems very wise of the church to devise the calendar of the church year so that Easter falls in the midst of such hope. Lent is our most somber season, when we focus on repentance and turning around. Those may be painful processes; they are nearly always challenging. We don't like to focus on faults and failure and frailties – not even when we lend them a more positive air by calling them "growing edges". We're often content with the status quo – or would like to be - and often God is not. If our status quo means an unnecessary distance between ourselves and God. God is not content.

in hope, and in grace, and in the sure knowledge of God's extravagant love. As we turn more surely toward God, our own inner "quality of light" changes. We become lighter and brighter, and we see more clearly. We know, in the midst of metanoia, the increasing warmth of God's closeness. We can feel the Spring of God's Presence more deeply.

March and Lent are seasons of hope. Spring is not yet here, perhaps, but is hovering about us like a grace. Let's each pray for all, that together we may enter Easter filled with hope and with light, to the glory of God.

GINGER BUTTERNUT SQUASH CASSEROLE (contributed by Mother Lynn Sinnott)

Serves 4

Ingredients

- o 1 1/2 lbs butternut squash, cut into 3-inch chunks (or other winter squash)
- o 2 tablespoons butter
- o 2-3 teaspoons ginger, peeled, minced
- o salt & pepper

1 tablespoon brown sugar

Directions

Steam the squash over salted water for about 20 minutes or until tender.

Melt butter and gently sauté ginger

While the squash is still warm, process with the ginger and butter until it has a smooth texture.

Taste, season with salt& pepper.

If you wish add the brown sugar (it gives it a mellow taste).

Place in casserole.

You may now cover and refrigerate until 30 minutes before dinner (or up to 3 days) or cover and put in a

350 oven for 20 minutes.

very scant ½ C ginger, peeled and minced

INTRODUCING RECENT MEMBERS - LEE SILVERSTRIM

Spiritual Autobiography? I was born the fifth son of eleven children, at home. Two of my older brothers died, one by drowning and the other of illness leaving me number three among my surviving siblings. We lived on a farm outside of Dushore, Pa., where I was grateful to be selected to help my mother in the house. Dairy farming is demanding and cows need milking twice a day whatever the weather. We attended the



Dutch Reformed church in town, now UCC. I think I got my sense of reverence mostly from my mother, as I was closer to her growing up.

I graduated from High School in 1958 with a low draft number. Knowing this would catch up to me sooner than later, I signed up for the Army and served mostly in Germany from 1959 until 1963. During 1958-59, while dating a girl who was Greek Orthodox, I often attended local Greek Orthodox services, especially during special Holy days. I loved their processions. While in Germany, I mainly attended Roman Catholic services which were quite different in tone from those stateside. Much less rigid and more joyful than I had come to expect back home. I like liturgy and ritual. I suppose for me the draw to God is the power of mystery and awe combined with real service and concern for people. And my seeking is strongly powered with a deep desire to serve God while serving and working with others.


Elaine and I were married in February of 1969. It was a second marriage for both of us but we began our married journey in St. Peter's Episcopal Church outside of Tunkhannock, Pa., where I worked as a manager for Procter & Gamble at their Pampers Plant. While working for P & G, we moved to Missouri, then California, then Georgia, for plant startups, before being transferred back to Tunkhannock in 1977. In those travels and transfers we always found a church home, worked with Youth Fellowships and at several churches sitting on church council, various committees, Bible Study leader, and other positions of leadership. I guess we were both searchers and seekers and workers


It was back in Tunkhannock that Elaine began her journey to ordination, hardly a straight path. Little did I realize how her response to call would make such a large change in my own responses. It's difficult to explain all the challenges of being the spouse of a female priest. Suffice to say, I stood out. But it also taught me that service and leadership are exercised in many different ways, not always in specific leadership positions. It meant serving on committees, but not being the chair. It meant providing advice, but not having primary say. It meant finding God and serving Him in ways not always comfortable to me. More like Jesus washing the feet of his disciples and telling them to do likewise. Mine is a journey that has led me through Cursillo, EFM (graduate & mentor), and stints on Diocesan Council as well as the Standing Committee in several Dioceses where Elaine has served as priest.

Both of us became immediately attracted to Christ Church, Xenia. It is a small church that has a great impact on serving the local community. I can't say that I really want to be on the vestry. But I'm willing to be on vestry if it will help the church move into its best self at this time. However much most of us seem to be getting older, God still has plans for us and Christ's work of love and deep compassion isn't done. If I can help, I'm willing to do my part.
