

NEWS FROM OUR MISSIONARIES

GREEN TEAM

The Green Team would like to remind you that Farmer's Markets are beginning to show up again. Fresh, local, healthy food is waiting for you. The harvest is in full swing. Many will even have fall decorations, pumpkins, squash, and straw bails for the coming season. While your pondering your yard decorations, we would like to share a recipe as an alternatives to harmful commercial pesticides or herbicides. The recipes quoted below as well as the source



"To make ½ cup of herbicide use:

- ●¹/₄ cup vinegar
- •1/4 cup table salt
- •1/4 cup dish soap

Mix these three ingredients together and place them into a spray bottle and then spray the mixture on your plants. The vinegar kills the weeds and the salt prevents the weeds from growing. Soap permits the herbicide mixutre to cling to the plant."

For those annoying sap-sucking insects -- such as aphids, thrips, spider mites and whiteflies -- create a home-made oil spray using 1 tablespoon of dish soap [not containing bleach] and 1 cup of cooking oil from a newly open bottle of oil. This concentrated liquid must be mixed with water before use with a ratio of 4 teaspoons of oil mixture to 1 pint of water. Until you are ready to use it, store the concentrated oil mixture in a glass jar in a dark, dry and cool location. Apply a liberal mist of the homemade oil spray to the vegetables once every seven days to thoroughly control the pests."

Then let's consider some daily definitions that are being thrown around on the subject of composting. Recyclable does not equal Compostable and vice versa.

Recyclable: Items like paper products, glass bottles and jars, metal tins/cans, plastic bottles, and cartons. These items need to be clear of food grease. For instance, the pizza box top, but not the bottom if the grease soaked in to it. This all is recyclable, meaning that it can be processed and made into something else commercial. It needs to be loose (not bagged) and dumped into a recycling bin. If you bag your recycling, most plants will NOT open your bag and will send the bag to the landfill. Compostable: Paper products, food, lawn cuttings/sticks, anything marked compostable. These products can be taken to composting organizations or dumped into a composter or compost pile. Be careful with the food products because grease slows the process and meat smells summon wildlife.

Landfill: Anything that can't be recycled or composted. It is sad when recyclable items end up in the landfill, it is less sad when compostable items end up here. The compostable plate will break down within a year, unless preserved by some other factor., such as grease or being in a plastic bag. Glass bottle will last 1 million years, plastic beverage bottles will last 450 years-eternity, and aluminum can will last 80-200 years. Things that are only destined for landfill which have alternative replacements: Styrofoam cups and disposable diapers will last 450 years—eternity, a plastic bag will last 10-20 years, and a cigarette butt will last 1-5 years... http://des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wmb/coastal/trash/documents/marine_debris.pdf http://sciencelearn.org.nz/Contexts/Enviro-imprints/Looking-Closer/Measuring-biodegradability

Want to help the environment? The quick way is to avoid Styrofoam and plastic whenever you can, use biodegradable or recyclable plastic when you must, choose plant fibers (bamboo) over old wood, and recycle everything that you can. Remember, that compostable product may not be recyclable, but it won't be a burden like the Styrofoam to the environment.

Heart and Hands continues to meet faithfully almost every two weeks. Prayer shawls have taken a back seat to the making of preemie bonnets. At the last meeting we had made 110 bonnets, with a goal of 150, which is approximately a three month supply. The finished and blessed bonnets will go to MVH in Davton.



Perhaps after this crunch for so many preemie bonnets, we will again have more diversity with shawls, scarfs, bonnets, Chemo hats for children and adults; suggestions are welcomed.

Plans are afoot to gather at The Wool Gathering in YSO, this September. Also a luncheon and 'fiber' shopping spree is in the planning stage for November. A reminder to our church family, all are WELCOME to share in this ministry. You can learn to crochet or knit in a matter of a couple hours, which is the length of our biweekly meetings. Also you may simply sit and chatter, pray, share your ideas. For projects, bring anything you choose to work on, or nothing but yourself. We laugh and share some wisdom; please consider joining us. 



For those who are young, those who think they are young, those who feel young at heart, and those who aren't any of the above (nobody's looking... Have some fun!)






